It is about building upon the skills, of local people and empowering residents to come together to respond to Local concerns and develop stronger communities.

Community Ministries ... on the Move

Following the temporary closure of the Community Kitchen and the

United Drop-in centre of our church, both activities will resume in October. The Community Kitchen will continue to provide hot meals to the community every day, while the United Drop-in centre will be open every second Sunday of the month providing meals, health checks, showers and a place to relax and chat.

Working with other local community groups, the Centre of Help and Hope (CHH) will continue to deliver health checks and other services to its users and the wider community from October. The church Community Services department is looking to expand its Steps Up education programme, striving to offer skills-based training to members of the community.

The Golden Age Club, which caters for senior individuals in the church and local community offering holistic wellbeing, has reopened every Thursday afternoon. The club had been temporarily closed earlier this year following the untimely death of the late sister Penelope Thompson, the initiator of the club, who forty years ago saw the need for older members to meet in a safe place for social activities, knowing how much the church owed to those dedicated members who in their younger days contributed selflessly to the betterment of the church, she felt that the church should return the favour.

Discussions are underway regarding the Winter Nights Shelter project which aims to provide a warm space, showers, fellowship, meals and a place to sleep in partnership with the local council for sleeping rough.

The number of people signing up to the CHH food bank continues to rise at a time when other food banks in the area have closed their doors to the public. Open two days a week, on Tuesdays and Fridays, the CHH food bank currently feeds an average of more than 625 individuals a month with registration of more than 550 people continuing to rise each month, excluding the many other people to whom supplies are delivered because they are unable to leave the house.

Besides all the above, Ida's love of service drove her to use her cooking skills for the annual SDA charity event, Harvest and Ingathering still, you could equally see her leading out in Bible studies or steadfastly spread the love of God to every one she met distributing booklets, leaflets and other Christian literature wherever her steps would take her across London. In steps with Jesus-Christ's instructions, she made it her principle to visit the sick in hospital, spending quality time with patients on the wards, who were alone without visitors. After many long years, for her

services to God and the church, Ida was made an Honorary Elder in January 2015.



Receiving her letter from King Charles III in celebration of her 100 years, Ida could well reflect on her good works over the years, which included the adaption of many daughters, sons, grandchildren and great-grandchildren. riah Matthias Esson was born on 27th May 1925, in the small district of Big Bridge near Savanna-La-Mar in the parish of Westmoreland, Jamaica. He is the 3rd of six siblings who are all deceased. He has six children (5 girls and 1 boy), seven grandchildren, three greatgrandchildren and three greatgrandchildren.


Brother Esson was baptized in 1951 at the Savanna-La-Mar Seventh-Day Adventist Church in Jamaica. He was engaged in Lay activities, with Sister Perry (now deceased), mother of Pastor Cecil Perry, passed Conference and British Union Conference president in the UK. This involved visiting the Savanna-La-Mar hospital and infirmary, preaching and giving Bible studies to the patients and residents respectively on sabbath afternoons.

He migrated to the United Kingdom in 1962. He worshipped firstly at the New Gallery, then at Chiswick, followed by West Kilburn (now Emmanuel), Hampstead and Stone Bridge SDA churches. He is currently a member at the Willesden SDA church for a number of years.

He loves sharing the gospel with others. As a result, he is known as "Preacher" outside of the church community. He spent much time

visiting sick members in hospitals, and in their homes, singing and praying with them. He also preached in churches around London occasionally.

Brother Esson is now 98 years old. He is affectionately referred to as "patriarch" by some of the members of his church. He knows his Bible and is known for challenging interpretations he thinks are unbiblical. He is an ardent supporter of the prayer line. He contributes by giving the devotional talks, singing and praying. The members of the church love him. If they do not hear him on the prayer line on a given morning, they become concerned.
